Time allocated per week for curriculum music

The National Plan for Music Education (NPME) recommend that schools timetable at least one hour each week of the school year for music throughout Key Stages 1 and 2.

We currently timetable:

- Key Stage 1 One hour per week
- Key Stage 2 One hour per week

Music curriculum

 Our music curriculum is informed by the model music curriculum (March 2021), non-statutory guidance for teaching music from Key Stages 1 to 2 or any other published curriculum guidance.

Opportunities for pupils during lesson time

- As a school, we provide the following opportunities for pupils to learn to sing or play an instrument during lesson time:
 - Violin ensemble tuition for every child in Year 4
 - Double bass tuition for pupils in the ASC Base
 - RockSteady lessons- pupils learn to play an instrument as part of a rock band.

Partnerships

- Hull Music Hub / named music education organisation (if applicable) support our music curriculum in the following ways:
 - Providing annual INSET/CPD for teaching staff
 - o Reviewing and editing curricular documentation
 - Hosting singing and instrument performances and showcases for pupils to participate in
 - Attending school to perform
